River Report: by Guy Jeans (Flyguy)

Hello everybody, this is a fly fishing report for the week of 08-27-14 written on Wednesday 08-27-14.

20 Mile Section (Kernville up to the Johnsondale Bridge) The upper river is now running around 125 CFS. Upper river conditions are tough near town with water temps pushing high temperatures. Water temps near town are 55-60 in the early am first light session and 60-70 degrees in the middle of the day (not recommended). Water temps above town near Limestone are 55-60 degrees early in the morning, warming to 60-65 degrees mid-day.

We are starting to see some top water dry fly Caddis action this week around 7:00 pm, and we are also getting fish on small size 24 to medium sizes nymphs in sizes 14-12. I've been having my client's fish hoppers and ant patterns and it's been very successful on top. There has been great action stripping streamers as well as swinging soft hackles in the riffles. If you fish near the town of Kernville or below, make sure to fish early, from first light till 10:00 am or the last 2 hours of daylight for best fishing. Fishing up river near Limestone, the water temps are holding and are a lot cooler with less moss on the rocks.

Remember to catch and release those trophy fish so somebody else has a chance to enjoy those big fish too. Somebody else has probably caught and released that fish so you could catch it. Pretty Cool!!!

The 4 mile wild trout section (Open year round) Fishing has been good! Remember, this area is Catch and

Release barbless hooks only!! Flows have been at around 150 CFS and water temps are cooler at 55 degrees up here and up river.

<u>Lake Isabella</u> Crappie fishing has slowed but they are still in the shallows. The lake is very low and fishing various streamers with a floating line or sink tip is getting the job done. Rainbows are looking up first light and taking midges on the surface with some great top water action near Camp 9, Paradise Cove and the main dam. Bass fly fishing is good in about 15ft of water first hour of light and Carp fly fishing is ok.

<u>Lower Kern</u> The lower Kern is fishing well for Largemouth and Smallies! Water temps down on the lower are about 5 degrees warmer than the upper. The water is at a good flow at 167 CFS as of today between Borel and Democrat. Bass fishing on fire...

<u>Tributaries of the North and South Fork Kern</u> (Open) The water level is low and fishing is not recommended.

<u>South Fork of the Kern from Rockhouse North</u> (Open) The water level is low and fishing is not recommended.

2014 SWCFFF Inter-Club Rod Building Challenge

Ok, last month we posted about the "SSFFC Rod Building Challenge". Since we are the club sponsoring this I figured we better be up on what it takes to win it. The other clubs definitely aren't going to take it easy on us so let's go over some of the tips to making your build outshine the competition. Now these aren't just tips you can use for the competition, they apply to everyday rod building. The following tips are just some things to give your custom build that over the top look.

#1: HAVE FUN!!!! This isn't a life or death competition. It doesn't matter if you have 1 or 100 rods under your belt. It's all about building up CFR's equipment inventory. Newbies, need somebody to bounce ideas off? Shoot me an e-mail and I'll put you in touch with one of the club's hot runners. Never met a builder yet who isn't willing to talk rod building.

Basically we are going to be giving the judges a list of build aspects they need to judge the "Craftsmanship" category. Here is what goes into a top shelf rod:

Guides:

- PREP EM: Unless you use something like Snake Brand guides there will be some foot prep. File yourself a smooth ramp for the thread to go up. A common place for thread gaps is at the transition from the blank to the foot.
- **DE-BURR:** De-burr the sides and bottom of the guides. Burrs can cut your thread or show up as sharp lines under your thread wraps.
- COLOR THEM: If you use black or dark nickel guides and have done any prep work on them, either paint or use a Sharpie maker on the bare metal. Yes, the bare foot does show up under the thread, especially if you aren't using color preserver or color fast thread.
- LINE EM UP: If we look down the rod and see that the guides aren't lined up properly.... well I am

- betting that might mark a few points off on the judging.
- BUILD ON THE DOG LEG: If you blank has a bend to it, build with the guides lined up on the convex side of the curve. That way the bend is hidden and with the rod lined up the weight of the line wants to straighten the rod.

Wraps:

- PACK & BURNISH: Pack those wraps. Prior to packing and burnishing your wraps they may look good, but we all know that once finish is applied even the tiniest gaps will rear their ugly heads. Burnish down those little humps made by the tag ends.
- EQUAL LENGTH WRAPS: Whatever the number
 of wraps you like to go with before the thread starts
 up the guide foot, keep it consistent. The wrap
 lengths need to be proportional to the size of the
 guide. Not all wraps are created equal (in length).
 That is why we count the turns before the thread
 starts up the guide foot.
- STARTING & STOPPING: Keep your tie in and finishing points consistent. There is no right or wrong place to start and stop your thread, but you need to keep it consistent throughout the build. If you start 180° off the guide stop it 180° off the guide for all you guides and ferrule wraps.

Finish:

- NO FOOTBALLS: You know those football shaped guides we have all seen and probably applied? Just say no to them. You want as level a finish as you can get. Do whatever it takes to obtain the level look. Sand them; apply thinner coats if you need to... use every trick in the book to avoid the dreaded footballs. This isn't the NFL.
- **SMOOOTH:** Work to obtain a glass smooth finish. No fisheye, dust boogers, thread nubs or thread ridges in the finish. Glass is the word you are looking for to describe your finish work.
- **CLEAN LINES:** Strive to keep your finish lines even and hopefully fairly close to the thread.
- FILL THE TUNNEL: Make sure to get your finish under the guide. Fill that thread tunnel. Gaps between the thread and guide will eventually allow water to wick under the finish.

Bonus Tidbits:

- Make sure all the section lengths are the same. Check your section lengths when you dry fit your tip top and handle. If all the sections aren't the same length cut down the tip and butt sections. Typically it can be 3/16" to 1/4" off the sections depending on the make of your handle and tip top. Remember!!! Don't cut the excess off the ferrule end of the section. Been there, done that!
- Keep it clean. Remember alcohol is your friend when it comes to cleaning up excess epoxy from your reel seat and handle.

- Ream it close. If you decide not to use a winding check, make sure that you control your reamer. A large gap between your handle and blank is no Bueno.
- If you use color preserver (CP) and want to avoid the dreaded splotches that can happen due to insufficient application, try this: Once the CP is applied and dried run the wrap under some water. Moisture will darken the thread showing you where the CP is weak. Let the thread dry and apply more CP. Repeat as necessary.



Fly Fishing Book Review: by Ants Uiga (Ants)



David Stanley's No Nonsense Guide to Fly Fishing in Nevada

with Jeff Cavender Published 1997 David Communications, Sisters, OR 48 (plus VI appendix) pages In 1983, Dave Stanley purchased the Reno Fly Shop. Although Stanley's ownership of the fly shop ended several years ago, he is still active in guiding. The Reno area is near the NV / CA border, so the book covers CA waters as well as NV ones.


Although most initial thoughts of NV provide images of dusty and dry deserts, the fly casters at Pyramid Lake will have images of trophy size Lahontan Cutthroats and ladders and probably some highly variable weather conditions. Pages 24 and 25 describe the conditions for Pyramid Lake.

If you are traveling to Eastern Nevada, fishing options exist around Ely and Elko, as well as northern locations near Mountain City and Denio. The eastern locations are familiar to me as I drove to the Bonneville Salt Flats. Next time I head in that direction, I will check the guide and bring a fly rod. The northern locations are a complete mystery, but a little less so since the fishing and access details are provided in the book.

The majorities of the locations are around Reno / Carson City / Tahoe and provide familiar locations to most fishermen. If you are interested in adding a tiger trout to your catch history, then pages 32 and 33 will provide the guidance you need. The guide covers the well-known fishing locations and does not reveal any secrets. The secrets are for you to discover. However, if you are passing through the area, it offers options on places to fish if the weather or road access forces a change in plans. Seems like a good reason to keep a copy in your travel bag.

ALBINO BARON

Here we have yet another winner from the jewel of the eastern Sierra's, Crowley Lake. Designed by Crowley guide Mickey Baron, the Albino imitates the prolific hatches of chironomids on the lake when in their larval form.

The larvae of the chironomid (midge) are often reddish in color and Mickey designed his Baron flies to cover this stage. The original Baron is tied with a dark red or reddish/brown thread, extra small black wire and a very small 1/16 black nickel bead. He keeps the thread body very slender to mimic the naturals and adds a white bead as an attractor to create the "Albino" version. This fly fishes fantastically on most mornings and is often a strong producer all day long. A strong testament to the quality of this fly is that Kent Rianda, of the competing guide service at Mammoth's Troutfitter, has regularly listed the Albino Baron as the top producer this summer on the lake.

I don't know exactly what thread Mickey uses, but I tie mine with Wine UTC 70 denier. The wine color is very close to the original, lies flat for a thin profile and has a wonderful sheen. Mickey also uses the smallest available 1/16 beads, but I don't have any white in that size, so I substitute the larger 5/64 or even larger 3/32 sizes. You may also substitute pearl glass beads, but from my limited experience, I have found those to be an inferior choice, catching fish, but not as many. The hooks that I have been using lately are Tiemco, The Fly Shop, or Togen equivalent of the 2302 or even stronger 2305. These are hopper style hooks with a nice bend and relatively long profile, but more strength than the Tiemco 200R or 2312.


Materials:

Hook: 2302 or 2305 hopper 14-16 or substitute


Bead: 1/16 White Tungsten, White Brass, or Pearl Glass

Thread: UTC 70 Wine or substitute Wire: Black x-small Ultra Wire


Tying Instructions:




 Debarb hook and slide bead onto hook shank. Insert hook into vise and attach thread behind the bead. Note that the thread is lying flat and not in a rope. This helps keep a thin profile.



2. Attach wire to the top of the hook with a few thread wraps. Again note the flat thread.



3. While using an occasional counterclockwise twist on the bobbin to keep the thread flat, wrap the thread back on the shank holding the wire above the shank as you go to keep it aligned on top. Wrap to part way down the bend. Note the thin smooth profile of the underbody.



4. Now wrap back up the shank to behind the bead. Keep the thread flat as you go and build a small thread ramp behind the bead for the thorax.



5. Wrap wire forward in even wraps. Most midges have about 10 segments so 9 wraps is about right. A few more or less will not deter strikes. Tie down wire with a couple of thread wraps and remove excess by spinning wire while keeping tension on thread and wire.



6. Coat with Zap-a-Gap or CA glue.

Tips & Techniques: by Ryan Buhler (ryan)

Five Tips on Landing More Fish from your Float Tube at Lake Crowley

1. Use fluorocarbon Tippet. Midging or stripping, it's stronger than nylon and less visible.

- 2. When midging or stillwater nymphing, fish closer to your tube. The more line you have out the more you have to get up off the water before you can pull the leader to set the hook. When fishing from a boat you are higher off the water and it's easier to move the line up when you set the hook. The lower you sit on the water means you will have more line to move on the set. Decrease the amount of line on the water by fishing closer to you and it will take less energy and time to set the hook.
- 3. Commit to the hook set. When your indicator moves set fast and strong. It's just like playing golf or baseball you have to commit to your swing. You will never be a good golfer or hitter buy swinging halfway. Same with midging at Crowley set the hook commit all the way if know fish is on just cast it back out.
- 4. If fishing streamers from your tube, slowwww your troll down. Leeches and perch fry aren't flying around the lake at warp speed. Try mimicking what the real things do. Leeches undulate slowly around the bottom, Perch fry cruise around the weeds and can be found at any depth. The one exception are the damsel nymphs. Sometimes a fast retrieve can be the ticket.
- 5. Like all fishing come with a positive attitude and look up and enjoy the view.
