Our Club is holding a special raffle for the fire victims from the Erskine Fire. The fire has devastated lives in the Kern Valley area. There were 2 fatalities, 257 buildings destroyed, over 48,000 acres burned and the total costs estimate amounted to over \$19 million. We are requesting donations in \$10 increments. The funds will be used to purchase Vons certificates and distributed to the fire victims. River Report: by Guy Jeans (Flyguy)

<u>20 Mile Section of the Kern</u> (From Kern River Fly Shop to Johnsondale Bridge)

The 20 mile section of the Kern from our shop to the Johnsondale Bridge is the most heavily fished section of the Kern because of the roadside access and heavily planted areas of Triploid trout (trout that cannot reproduce). This section is also home to wild (not native) rainbow and brown trout. This section is fishing very well with big rainbows being caught throughout the whole section. River flows in this section are around 160 cfs which are perfect for wading. Best flies to use are attractor flies like the Bead Head Kern Emerger and the Bead Head Royal Flush. There are hatches coming off like Caddis and Hoppers. Are the fish looking up and eating on the surface? Yes, also in the evening around 7pm till dark for the Caddis hatch. Water temperatures are starting to rise in this section and are reaching 65 degrees around 2pm. Good techniques to use are nymphing under an indicator, dry dropper or stripping streamers. If you want to have good fishing on the 20 mile section of the Kern, now is the time! Check out the recent catches below.

4 Mile Wild Trout Section (Above Johnsondale Bridge 4 miles)

This section of the Kern is very popular with folks who want to have a wild trout experience. There are special regulations here and bait or barbed hooks are prohibited. Only artificial lures or flies with barbless hooks are allowed. Many tickets are issued here to anglers who disregard the fishing regulations. The DFW does not stock the North Fork of the Kern River north of the bridge for 50 miles and those 50 miles are managed as a wild trout fishery. The fly fishing is excellent here because of these regulations. Check your regulations before fishing here!

Water temperatures are usually 5 to 10 degrees cooler here and the fish are very wary to your presence. A stealthy approach is needed to catch these fish. Fishing is excellent as of today. Dry dropper techniques and nymphing are getting the grabs. The biggest Stoneflies in the world reside here and fishing the flies that imitate them can get you some great fights.

Forks of the Kern (Special Regulations)

Fly fishing here is world class and the dry fly fishing legendary.

Lower Kern (Below lake Isabella)

A bass fly angler's paradise! The lower Kern winds its way down the Kern River canyon from the Lake Isabella Dam to Oildale, approximately 80 river miles. This section has trout, bass, crappie and other species to catch on a fly. This section is fishing excellent for bass right now. Use big flies like White Jawbreakers or poppers to get into these fish. Guy Jeans' guided fly fishing for bass trips have become very popular and he does them weekly. Great fly rod to use on the lower Kern for bass is a 9 foot 6wt or 7wt Redington Vapen Black, Redington Behemoth 7/8 Reel and a Rio Small Mouth Bass Fly Line.

South Fork of the Kern

Open!

The South Fork of the Kern River is a special fishery and is home to our states freshwater fish, the Golden Trout. It is also home to the predatory non-native Brown trout who considers the small golden trout a tasty treat. Consider using flies that replicate small golden trout next time you fish the South fork of the Kern or use a mouse fly in the late evening.

Can you catch a Golden Trout here? Yes you can, and it will count towards your "Wild Heritage Trout Program".

Watch out for Bigfoot! Many sightings have occurred here.

Tributaries of the Southern Sierra

Can you catch a Little Kern Golden Trout here? Yes you can, and it will count towards your "Wild Heritage Trout Program".

Lake Isabella

North Fork Special



Years ago, when I first really got into fly tying, the club had Tim Wade from North Fork anglers in Cody, WY speak to the club. In his newsletter introduction, there was a picture of a fly. A "North Fork Special." It is a small winged stonefly looking thing with cool tails and white wings. For some unknown reason that little fly just spoke to me, so I ordered a couple and spent the next month or so trying to get one to look just right. This involved many trips to Chuck's for inspections, help and guidance. I will never forget explaining my exasperation at never being able to get those wings to flare correctly and be the same length. Chuck would hold the mess of a fly I just gave him and examine it so carefully, as if he were admiring the best fly ever. He would then look at me, smile that smile and tell me, "This fly looks great. You know, the fish can only see one side at a time." So with that encouragement, I started fishing the fly...a lot!!! 
Happy Day Planner

Fly Fishing Book Review: by Ants Uiga (Ants)



Steelhead Paradise (add Canadian maple leaf)

By John F. Fennelly Frank Amato Publications, Portland, OR Published 1963, 1989 114 pages

Steelhead Paradise by John Fennelly continues my reading into the realm of steelhead fishing. The book covers the Skeena Valley drainage area in Northern British Columbia, Canada. The notable city is Prince Rupert on the mouth of the Skeena River drainage. The notable rivers are the Morice, Babine, Kispiox, Sustut, and Johanson. The upper end fishing options include lodges with price tags of \$7,000 per week. I wonder if there are options for the more budget minded folks, like me. The driving distance from Bodfish to Prince Rupert is 1,800 miles with many, many fly fishing distractions along the way. Stay tuned to see if this ever happens.

Fennelly's first trip to the Skeena Valley was in 1951 and it required six visits over a period of years to cover the waters and provide information for the book. As the author was able to travel to more parts of the drainage, some dirt roads enabled his travels, but these would better be considered logging roads rather than any comfortable highway.

The Skeena Valley drainage is a huge area. The river miles could be in excess of 400 miles from mouth of the river to uppermost drainages. (The distances would seem even larger since they would be presented in kilometers instead of miles.) As with many salmon / steelhead drainages, the migratory fish include many species returning to various smaller rivers. It seems a single species returns to the home spawning river on a different schedule than the schedule one would assume based on river distances. At times, the

spawning fish may arrive at a location 300 miles from the mouth of the drainage earlier than the same species would arrive at a location that is only 100 miles upriver (how is that for confusion). The timing of the runs and available fishing options occur after runoff, so at places the fishing begins in late August or September. The end of the fishing season is usually determined by winter conditions or the hardiness of the fisher. Fennelly relates one experience when the temperature dropped to minus sixteen (Fahrenheit) at night. The services of a lodge were appreciated the next day.

As you can imagine, the setting is fabulous and the fishing is superb, if your timing is good. Lodge reservations are booked at least a year in advance. I would guess the repeat customers have first option for the more predictable fishing dates. Some of the insights noted by the author were that in the 45 degree water, the steelhead are as apt to take a dry fly as well as a wet fly. Be sure to check with current practices before you base your whole fishing strategy on a single comment.

I was greatly entertained by the book. My armchair fly fisherman was fully satisfied. My inquisitive fly fisherman had me order another related book. The next time I see a post of steelhead fishing in this area, I will give it a much more informed praise. Maybe the VW camper bus can make it to that area after all.

<u>SHAFT</u>

Here's another from Crowley Lake Guide Mickey Baron for you Crowley Lake junkies!!

On many of the days with a good chironomid hatch on Lake Crowley it is absolutely essential to have a quality grey pattern that you have confidence in. For many long time fisher's on the lake, the Shaft is just that. A very simple fly with only three materials, it can be so effective that you can literally catch dozens of fish on it during a prolific hatch if you are in the right spot!

Add a white bead on top of or instead of the black nickel bead and you have a Shaft Emerger. These flies are excellent fished together with the Shaft Emerger hanging about 12"-18" above the original Shaft on your leader. Mickey ties them in two sizes. The small version is tied on a size 16 scud hook and the larger is tied on a 2x or 3x long size 16 (TMC 200R or 2305 equivalent).

P.S. These flies are great in other stillwaters and believe it or not....rivers too!

Tie some up, throw'em in your box and go fishing!

P.S. Crowley Lake Guide Ernie Gulley will be presenting to the SSFFC in Kernville on Saturday September 17th! Make space on your calendar! Word is that Ernie has a superior presentation and I can tell you first hand that Ernie, much more often than not, out fishes all other guides on the lake. I have seen on well more than a dozen occasions where Ernie's clients are catching more fish than any other boat in the area. He really knows his Stillwater nymphing! There will also be a "Crowley Lake Boat Rental" gift certificate for \$100 up for raffle at the meeting. This will get the winner a full day on a 30hp flat bottom boat. Hope to see you there!!

Materials:

Hook: 16 scud or 16 2x long (TMC 2305)

Bead: Black Nickel 1/16 or 5/64

Thread: Blue Dun (UTC 70) or Grey 8/0


Wire: Black X-small

Coating: Zap a Gap

Tying Instructions:



1. Debarb hook, add bead and insert into vise. Attach thread directly behind bead.




2. Attach wire with two or three wraps atop the hook shank.



Wrap thread toward the back of the shank keeping the thread flat (easier with the UTC). Note how the thread is not roped and is wrapping very smoothly.



4. Continue to 1/3 or $\frac{1}{2}$ way down the hook bend.



Wrap thread back to the front with the same technique. Again, note how smooth and thin the body is.



6. Rib the wire forward over the thread with evenly spaced wraps. You may start with closer spaced wraps at the rear and increase the space as you move forward, much like the naturals. Most chironomids have approximately 10 segments, so 9-10 ribs are ideal, but I don't think the fish count them. I tie smaller sizes with 6-7 wraps and they get crushed too!



Cut or spin off excess wire after taking a few tightening wraps behind the bead. Whip finish or add three half hitches.



8. Coat the fly with Zap-a-Gap for sheen and durability. A reliable friend uses Sally Hansen Advanced Formula.

Sliding indicators

The last few years the trend at Crowley has been fishing deeper water when still water nymphing. Not by choice but because that's where the fish are. Sometimes that means

having 20 feet or more of leader between your flies and your indicators. If fishing with the traditional fixed indicator it makes landing a fish nearly impossible. That is where the sliding indicators come into play. The first sliders were a pain in the butt to use. Most had some kind of pin to hold your line and when you got a fish the tension would free the pin and the indicator would then slide up and down your leader freely and you could reel in enough line to land your fish. The problem was you had to set the pin just right for it to hold when you cast but not to tight that it wouldn't release when you hooked a fish. Fortunately some better models have been put on the market. The two that Rob and I like best are Air-Lock by Rajeff Sports and the Under-Cator by Sierra Drifters. Both work great as fixed or sliding indicators. Both have a rubber washer and screw system to tighten on your line. Both don't kink your leader and come in small and large versions. The advantage of the Air-Lock is it can be put on after you have rigged up. You remove the nut and washer and put your line in the slot then put the washer and nut back on and tighten. You can tighten all the way for a fixed indicator or loosen and have it slide. The Under-Cator has to be put on before you put your flies on. There is a small hole you thread your line through and then tighten as needed. Both are great products and work equally well in both styles. They are now the only indicators that I use. Give them a try at Crowley and on the river next time out.
